Our History

Way back in 1977, Patrick Reagan and Kevin Hendryx founded Silver Thistle Pipes and Drums on the University of Texas campus with the goal of developing a band that would compete within and outside Texas. The Band's first out-of-state competition was in Colorado in the mid-eighties, competing in Grade 4 under Pipe Major Kenneth Liechti, who has led the band for more than 30 years. In 1998, Silver Thistle became a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization promoting Scottish Highland piping and drumming in Central Texas. We have competed successfully across the US, in Canada and in Scotland, with Doug Slauson taking the helm as Pipe Major from 2011-2023. From our start as a teaching band and Grade 4 competition band, we added a Grade 3 competition band in 2002 when we were promoted by the Eastern United States Pipe Band Association.

Our Mission

The focus of the band has always been to bring the music of the Great Highland Bagpipes to Central Texas through community outreach and cultural education. One way we achieve this is through the major performances that Silver Thistle participates in such as the Austin Celtic Fest and St Patrick's Day celebrations. The Band promotes a highly acclaimed and successful Burns Supper, a cultural event which commemorates the life and poetry of Robert Burns, Scotland's most famous bard. We also put on performances for Tartan and St Andrews Days. We also strive to provide educational opportunities. We have a robust educational program that offers four levels of beginner instruction in bagpiping and drumming, which funnels into opportunities to join the band in competitions and performances.



Our Music

We have five recordings under our belt, from the first (available on cassette, if you remember what that is), through Samba Thistle and the Silver Album, released in 2005 to commemorate our Silver Anniversary a few years late. "Going for Gold" is meant to put us in the mood for celebrating our golden anniversary in 2027. The album contains contributions from the B band (grade 4), the A band (grade 3), Scottish small pipes and whistle duets and some solo performances.

The B band contributes their three 2023 competition sets: a quick march medley, march, strathspey and reel (MSR) and a medley. The A band provides its 2024 competition sets (MSR and medley) a set of 6/8 marches and three sets featuring some alternative percussion. The percussion for all the band pieces is delivered by the same talented and multifaceted drum corps. Duncan (smoking fingers) Peterson-Jones dazzles us with his solo pieces and Ken (old goat) Liechti slows the pace with a piobaireachd that highlights the distinction between Ceol Mor (the classical music of the Scottish Highland bagpipes) and Ceol Beag ("the light music", that includes marches, slow airs and dance music). We also feature some Scottish small pipe numbers with Jason Whitson (a former piper with the Band) accompanying on the whistle. We certainly hope that you enjoy the range of music that is provided in this album.
